Editor's Notes

As reported in the Summer Newsletter, five Parish Councillors were re-elected in May and a further five (all former Councillors) were co-opted at the May meeting. That left two seats to be filled on the Parish Council and the vacancies were duly advertised.

It is pleasing to report that a keen interest was shown in serving your Parish. Five candidates put their names forward as willing to become Councillors. Faced with this embarrassment of riches, the Council held a secret ballot, as a result of which Mrs Jane O'Sullivan and Mr Rupert Gutteridge, both from Gallowstree Common, were co-opted.

In the past the Council has

been inclined, when making co-options, to take into account the distribution of Councillors amongst the five villages and hamlets of the Parish. However there is no easy way of achieving this end when filling two vacancies by secret ballot.

The distribution of Councillors' addresses following the co-options in June is as follows, with figures in brackets showing the "due share" if seats were distributed strictly in proportion to the number of households in each settlement:
Gallowstree Common 4 (3.3),
Tokers Green 3 (3.3),
Kidmore End 2 (3.2),
Chalkhouse Green 2 (1.8) and
Cane End 1 (0.4).

So, it might be argued that Gallowstree Common now has one more than its fair share of

Councillors and Kidmore End is one short.

However, all Councillors are duty bound to uphold the interests of the Parish as a whole and so the notion of individuals "representing" a particular constituency within the Parish is probably false.

On the other hand, individual members bring to the Council's deliberations their special knowledge of a particular area and that is perhaps a good reason for aiming to have each part of the Parish represented by a roughly proportional number of Councillors.

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Report from The Chairman of the Parish Council

Dear Parishioner,

Firstly, I sincerely hope that no one suffered any flood damage of any sort during, or as a consequence of, the dreadful rains that were endured by all towards the end of July. I was actually out of the country at the time but, with the help of modern satellite technology, I was able to see all that was happening, which was pretty dire.

Since I last wrote, the Council has achieved a full complement of Members. Five residents offered their services as Councillor. The Council considered their written submissions at the June meeting and, after a ballot, decided to co-opt Rupert Gutteridge and Jane O'Sullivan, both of whom live in Gallowstree Common. Many of you will remember that Jane served on the Council from 1994 to 2001, while this is Rupert's first foray into local government.

Your Council was, of course, delighted to hear at the June meeting that the District Council had granted planning permission for the replacement pavilion at the Gallowstree Common Recreation Ground. My

Vice-Chairman, Roddy Young, is leading the search for funding for this project and I wish him every success. The existing building has served us well for the past 50 years or more, but the time has come for a 21st century facility at the Recreation Ground.

Some of you may have spotted the black post erected in Horsepond Road, Gallowstree Common. I believe that this heralds the automatic vehicle speed indicator sign: indeed, by the time you read this, the sign might be in use.

The Council, in response to popular demand, has asked the County Council to provide a salt or grit bin near the pond and well at Kidmore End. We have been assured that local residents will spread the materials when conditions are icy. Your Council will pay for this under what the Clerk tells me are the Section 137 monies, i.e. limited amounts which the Council can spend on items beyond its statutory powers. As I write, someone from the Highways Department has just

arranged to come out and agree the actual site for the bin.

I am sure that you will share the relief of many residents that the M1 bus service through the

58 additional pitches for gypsies required in Oxfordshire

Parish has been saved, although reduced to one journey each

way each weekday and Saturday. It looked at one point as if the bus would only come through the Parish for three days a week.

Finally, your Council has been consulted by the County and District Councils about the future provision of sites for gypsies and travellers across the South East of England. It has been assessed that some 58 additional pitches are required in Oxfordshire, although the County Council is sceptical that demand is that high. Your Council has commented that, if demand for additional pitches can be demonstrated, those pitches should be provided by extending existing sites. Pitches should not be provided in Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty or in locations where the whole range of local services is not available.

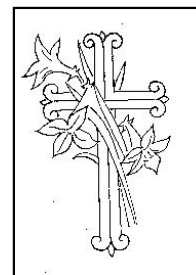

Saturday 16 June was our wettest Village Day for quite a few years, but we were not going to let the weather defeat us and we were still able to stay outside despite quite a few showers!

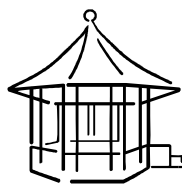

Accidents on the A4074

After an article appeared in the Sunday Times in May 2006 which labelled the A4074 the most dangerous road in Britain I had an exchange of emails with Boris Johnson, MP. I wanted to understand who was responsible for safety on the road and what

action was planned. To expedite the discussion I met him earlier this year and at my request he wrote to Oxfordshire County Council.

He forwarded the reply from Steve Howell, Head of Transport, which was as follows:

"We are acutely aware of the unfortunate casualty history on this section of the A4074 and local County Councillors are also

engaged in seeking improvements. However, whilst ascertaining the location and nature of accidents is relatively straightforward, identifying improvements which we can be

confident will make a real difference on

this section of the A4074 is much more difficult, especially when we have already made many improvements. There is a strong possibility we could spend a lot of money on measures that make the route look different but in reality do not help.

We are proposing to consult on a 40 mph limit in Cane End and a possible extension of the 50 mph limit to the school in addition to vehicle activated signs. When we

resume responsibility for speed cameras we will also investigate an alternative location for the camera as the current location limits its operational effectiveness.

For the longer term we are investigating a new system of average speed cameras although this will depend on developing technology gaining government approval for use in such allocation and costs falling as predicted."

Kidmore End Cricket Club

If you pay a visit to the Recreation Ground at Gallowstree Common you will discover two new seats that have been installed in memory of supporters of Kidmore End Cricket Club.

The first of these remembers Bill Townsend who died in August 2005 and who, at the time of his death, was President of the Club. Bill had been associated with the Club from 1948, when he was appointed secretary. He was also a player and made an enormous contribution to the development of the Club for the remainder of the 20th century. Bill was also much more of course, particularly involving the Parish of Kidmore End. He was a Parish Councillor, a manager of the primary school, a long standing pillar of St John's Church, Kidmore End, in which he filled a variety of positions, and a parish historian who, among other things, researched the background of the Palairret family. It was because of this research that Bill discovered and pursued the relationship of the Palairrets, whose patriarch had been responsible for establishing the cricket club in 1863, and Somerset County Cricket Club.

Many of you will remember the visits to the recreation ground of the full Somerset county side. Bill's seat is placed in one of his favourite spots for watching cricket and, should you visit, you might like to try it out for yourselves. Bill's family did not want a formal dedication ceremony and just wished to sit and remember and shed a tear or two.

The second seat is in memory of Stan Bates, who may not be known to you at all. Stan came to

know the cricket club through the Somerset connection and, after he died last year, his soul mate Brenda thought that a seat at Gallowstree Common would be most appropriate. Stan and Brenda lived in Hayes, Kent and their visits to Kidmore End were rare. However, on 14 July, Brenda with 20 of Stan's family and friends spent a very happy day at the ground to see the splendid new seat and to take part in a small ceremony during which the Club chairman, John Sheldon, paid tribute to Stan and reminded all present of his affection for the cricket club. It was a beautiful day and Brenda's party stayed on to enjoy an excellent match, duly won by the home team.

These are two very comfortable seats which, apart from the memories they bring, are an asset to the sports ground.

After the Marrant Thames Valley Cricket League matches played on 11 August the 1st and 2nd elevens remained undefeated. Several rainy Saturdays contributed to this state of affairs. Nevertheless, the 1st XI, playing in Division 2B, had won eight games out of 14 and was in second place, four points behind Chalfont St Peter, while the 2nd XI, in Division 5A, had won five and drawn five of its 14 fixtures. The 3rd XI have just recorded a remarkable 62 run victory over Datchet 3rds, a win which will have put this young side in good heart for the remainder of the season. The club president,

Mr F R E Curzon, was looking forward to fielding a strong XI against Mr A W Cuthbertson's XI at Gallowstree Common on 14 August.

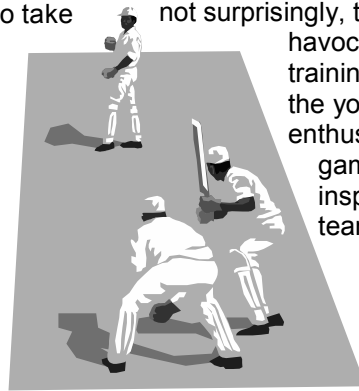
Kidmore End junior cricket has again proved popular with nearly 200 children signed up for this year. The 2007 season had to contend with a wild and wet late Spring and early Summer and, not surprisingly, this wreaked

havoc with fixtures and training. Nonetheless, the youngsters' enthusiasm for the game has been inspiring and all teams managed to play most of their Michael Shanly Berkshire League fixtures

as well as a fair number of friendly games during the season.

Divisional silverware eluded us again, although a boys' under-11 side reached the semi-finals and the girls' team won a local counties 6-aside shield against very strong opposition. Bad weather has put paid to our end-of-season floodlight competition, but we now look forward to introducing a new indoor training programme over winter, including the use of video analysis, helped by sponsorship from Johnson Matthey Fuel Cells.

The Cricket Club again hosted an inter-schools kwik cricket competition on 6 June. The event was blessed by fine weather for the ten primary school teams that participated. The winners were a team from Kidmore End Church of England Primary School.

This is about 63% **above** the normal average twelve month figure of 685 mm (27 in).

Although there were four separate dry spells, each of several days, this three month period has been notable for the very high rainfall, culminating in probably the highest daily total in living memory of 65 mm (2.56 in) on 20 July. This was almost half the total for this abnormally wet month!

The resulting high river flows gave the Thames flood waters a maximum speed of 215 cumecs (cubic metres per second) through the Reading gauging station on 26 July. This compares with 301 cumecs in the winter floods of 2003. At this time of year flows of 25 - 30 cumecs are usually seen.

It is interesting to find that the average water levels in the local wells (Kidmore End and Gallowstree Common) having fallen since their high in 2001, are just starting to show signs of an upward trend. The increase should be maintained with the deluges of this year!

Crime Statistics

Topical Tips

A few notes to motivate you and your plot of garden!

- Sow your spring cabbage now.
- Pick early pears while they are underripe.
- Lift and dry shallots when we have a dry spell.
- Twist the necks of onions to encourage ripening.
- Repair your garden buildings, replacing damaged timber and broken panes in your greenhouse.
- Give the hedges their final trim for this year.
- Harvest main crop carrots and store in a box of sand.
- Continue harvesting fruit, selecting the best for storing or freezing.
- Repair damaged lawns by removing worn patches, fill with fine soil and firm: sow grass seed and protect from birds.
- Reduce water and food given to house plants.
- Begin to order plants for the autumn and order spring flowering bulbs in good time for planting this autumn.

Temporary Closure of the A4074

Look out soon for notices on the A4074, warning of closure of the road over a weekend to allow for tree felling and hedge cutting operations.

The road between Cane End and Chazey Heath will be shut for two days to allow for the felling of dozens of roadside trees that are diseased or dangerously close to the verge in Green Dean Bottom and the clearance of saplings on the West side of the road in Green Dean Wood. At the same time, local landowners will make the most of this opportunity to cut back overgrown hedges on this stretch of highway, to improve visibility on one of the most dangerous parts of the road.

If you live in Gallowstree Common, Kidmore End or Tokers Green, it would also be a good plan to watch for this main road closure, since a marked increase in traffic flowing down our narrow lanes is inevitable whilst the work is going on.
